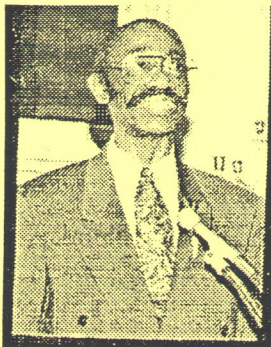

Professor **James P. Holland** earned two degrees from Indiana University in endocrinology: a master's degree in 1958 and a doctorate in 1961. During his 30 year tenure at IU (1967-1997), Dr. Holland's commitment to the university was exceptional, ranging from recruiting and mentoring students to serving as associate dean and interim dean of the Graduate School. Professor Holland also worked tirelessly to address the needs for minority students at IU. Dr. Holland received numerous awards including the George Pinnell Award for Distinguished Service and the Chancellor's Medallion. After his death in 1998, the Department of Biology began a graduate fellowship in his name to honor his commitment to students.



Professor **Homer A. Neal** is interim president emeritus and vice president emeritus for research, Samuel A. Goudsmit Professor of Physics and director of the UM-ATLAS Collaboratory Project at the University of Michigan Physics Department. He has been the recipient of numerous awards, including the Sloan Foundation Fellowship, the John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship, and the Indiana University Distinguished Alumni Service Award. Professor Neal received his BS in Physics with honors in 1961 from IU. He received his master's degree and doctorate in physics from the University of Michigan.
